A PART OF HISTORY

You hear an awful lot of stuff on the ham bands.

It is one thing to tune to a popular two meter repeater frequency and hear fishermen discuss their prowness. It's logical that technicans brag of their radio skills. It follows that there are experts on weather prognostication and traffic direction. And every good repeater has someone dialing the CHP even before the accident happens. However - it is something else when some turkey comes up and says "I was the guy who held Amelia Earhart's hand when she made the first woman's solo flight over the Pacific Ocean":

As if 146.04/.64 does not have enough problems.

This fellow, WD6EBW, Walter McMenamy, up in West Los Angeles, starting feeding this mal-arkey on our Otay repeater over a year ago. A secret committee was formed, and judgement was passed- "There is no truth in him":

There was no choice but to expose him. Two SQUELCH TALES staffers were dispatched to Los Angeles, and with the aid of a prominent Hollywood ham who is always seeking the truth, Walter was exposed.

The record shows: WD6EBW was born in St. Louis, Missouri, on August 8, 1905. He was an incubator baby, and led a tragic life, much in hospitals, until he was 20 years old. But he ate well. He had grown to six feet, eleven inches in height! In the early 20's, Walter became interested in radio and built galena crystal and simple tube sets for sale. And he became a Short Wave Listener nut.

By the 1930's, he was logging worldwide broadcast signals and distributing Patterson Radios, whose fine receivers were designed by Karl Pierson, W6BGH.

And now the truth.

Amelia Earhart was an American aviator. She was the first woman to cross the Atlantic. She was also the first woman to make a trans-Atlantic flight alone. In 1935, she set out to become the first woman to make a solo flight across the Pacific Ocean, from Hawaii to the mainland. Conditions established were that continuous radio contact be maintained.

The scheme was this: She would transmit from her airplane on 3105 kilocycles, call sign KNABQ, and receive on clear channel KFI from Los Angeles, whose 50,000 watts on 640 kilocycles would blanket the Pacific during the night time hours of the early part of the flight. Problem that developed was that no one could hear her signals in the States. until Walter came on the scene. While tuning for dx signals, he heard Amelia's test transmissions and caught on to the scheme. He contacted KFI and became a primary link for the flight. To quote from a letter from the Program Director of KFI, dated January 18. 1935, six days after the flight, "Miss Earhart's messages received by you were telephoned to KFI and were immediately broadcast over KFI's 50,000 watts for the information of radio listeners in general, and for Miss Earhart's information in particular were a source of great comfort and assistance to her".

In 1937, Amelia and her co-pilot Fred Noonan set off on a flight around the world. Walter was a ker participant in the radio links for the flight. See our copies of letters from Amelia and her husband, book publisher George Palmer Putnam, who financed the flight. Official reports tate that her last signals were heard on J ly 2, 1937, and that her plane was tost in the Pacific While trying to reach Howland Island. Walter feels that there is much more to the story.

So there is WD6EsW unveiled. Our hats off to you, Walter, for being a part of history! Our best to you and your charming wife Mary.

3. Announcements



BOARD MEETING

SANDRA, INC. Board of Directors

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors was called to order on April 1, 1982, at 7:30 P.M. at the Bonanza Resturant, 2633 E1 Cajon Blvd.

Directors present: W60GC, K8WEN, W6UZL, WA6JTB, WB6IKF, W6GIC, W6PDA.

Visitors present: N6ECL, AJ6L, AF6W, WD6CQM, W6INI.

- W60GC reported on the status of the club's insurance.
- 2. W60GC reported on the status of the Mt. Otay site. A map is being prepared by the engineer to show "as-built" and will be submitted shortly. It was recommended that the bond premium be paid, if it has not already been paid. It was also recommended that a meeting of the board be held to consider policies for other repeaters at the SANDRA site.
- Treasurer's report was deferred as the Treasurer was out of town.
- 4. W6GIC reported that we have 13 new members and 34 renewals, bring the total membership to 971, with 924 voting members.
- 5. Meeting Chairman, WB6IKF, reported that Bob Rubesh, Robot Research, will put on the program for our April Membership Meeting.
- W6UZL reported on SANDARC activities.During his report, W6OGC moved and W6PDA seconded a motion to approve SANDARC's funding of a scholarship in the amount of \$300. The motion was passed unanimously.
- 7. WBOXCC moved that the SANDRA delegate to SANDARC prepare a proposal that SANDARC reimburse Emergency Coordinators in San Diego County for administrative expenses, in sum not to exceen \$500 per year. The fund would be administered by the Section Emergency Coordinator. The motion was seconded by WA6JTB and passed unanimously.
- 8.Trustees report. W6PDA reported on Laguna. The ID'er is malfunctioning. Expects to have it fixed shortly. He plans to install the new 450 and 2 meter antennas as soon as weather permits, Nothing new to report in the move to the new building.

- 9. Technical Committee Chairman, AJ6L, submitted a candidate list for members of the technical committee for consideration by the Board. W6GIC moved, seconded by W6OGC, that they be approved. Passed unanimously. Members are: AJ6L, Tom Wilson, Chairman; W6PDA, Wayne Bamford, K6QL, Dave Fender, W6SS, Vance Belliston, and W6YVX, Ed Flinn, our four trustees; N7BDO, Rich Bennett, N6ECL, Stu Hacken, WA6QQQ, Bob Gonsett, K8WEN, Jack Carlson, and KF6Z, Tom Goldrich.
- W6U:L reported that Les, WA6QVW, had a prior committment and would present his Property Manager's report at the next Board meeting.
- 11. K8WEN reported to the Board on the Sunday nite net control. Members who wish to assume the net control for one or more Sunday evenings should contact him via the SANDRA P.O. Box or his home telephone number.
- 12. The following matters were discussed without action: AF6W proposed a secret society of SANDRA members to encourage improved operating habits on the repeaters. W6UZL raised the issue of hi-way signs giving repeater frequencies to visitors arriving in San Diego County. W6PDA discussed a proposal to provide the autopatch with a means for emergency activitation when the autopatch function is off. WA6JTB is going to contact the roofing contractor in regard to the roof on the Mt. Otay vault. AF6W discussed the need for member health and welfare announcements at membership meetings. It was noted that it is the policy of the club to send "get well" cards to members who are ill.
- 13. WB6IKF moved, and W6JTB seconded, a motion to adjourn, which passed unanimously at 9:34 P.M.

FLOOD WATCH

A headline in the Los Angeles Times on Friday, March 19, was "San Diego Drying Out After Heaviest Rainfall of Winter". The storm ripped the roof from a Loma Portal house, left 20,000 households temporarily without power, tore a dozen boats from their moorings in San Diego bay, flooded roads and stranded motorists. And the water was rising in City reservoirs and rivers.

Local amateur radio operators played a key role in this near emergency as volunteers with the San Diego City Emergency Management Office. Approximately 50 hams have now completed initial training in emergency management and are now registered with this office.

Wednesday, March 17, was the first real test of "Flood Watch" by hams who patrolled flood markers on the San Diego river, and Chollas and Carter creeks. That's where the water goes when we have a local gully washer.

Working the Flood Center at the desk of the City's Coordinator for Emergency Management, Bill Wulf, were KD6QJ, KM6S, N6BUK and W6UZL, working shifts. In the field were WA6LWL, W6FWF, K6DBJ, W6QLJ, W6BFQ, KR6K, K6QM, WB6TOH, KA6JEH, WA7HRA, W6LEY, WB6RJB, N6CUX, WA6BCC, NE6T, WA4SHP, KA6IAS, and WB6LLO. W6INI coordinated team and route assignments.

In addition to specific assignments for flood marker checks, the teams provided reports on road closures, stranded motorists, and in general provided extra eyes for regular city employees who were combatting the storm. Water levels in local resevoirs were recorded periodically at the center. Phones rang constantly with requests for information by citizens, and newspaper, radio and television reporters.





TECHNICAL CORNER

This month we are pleased to feature the handi-work of an ingenious SANDRA member, Carl Tillman, KA6IAS. Using readily available materials, he has designed a portable mast suitable for two meter antennas. As shown in our accompanying photo a Larsen 5/8 magmount sits on the ground plane on top. The mast is also compatible with a Ringo Ranger or a small beam. Even could be used as the center support for a low band inverted V. This mast puts the base of your antenna 15 feet above ground, yet breaks down to the easily portable components shown. For assembly, Carl timed himself from car trunk to on-the-air in ten minutes.

The only feature that will be beyond the reach of the average ham work bench will be the welded tripod joint. If you can't find a friend to do this little job for you, perhaps a drilled wooden block could substitute. He uses nylon cord for guying and 1/4" stainless steel welding rod for ground stakes.





I have had the extraordinary good fortune to get my hands on a rare copy of V.P. Pettybone's first notebook, in which he recounts, among other things, a visit to San Diego in 1980. V.P. had pretty good ears! After the promise of a few 807's, SQUELCH TALES editor agreed to publish it in it's entirety!

FROM V. P. PETTYBONE'S NOTEBOOK

During World War II Grampa Pettybone wrote about pilot mistakes and aircraft accidents in the Navy.

Grampa was somewhat of a crackerbarrel philosopher. His writing style was simple and to the point. He had a certain flare with the military jargon, and sprinkled in just enough slang to make the flavor a little salty.

Grampa liked to summarize formal Navy Aircraft Accident Reports which had all legal terminology and engineering falderal to successfully put the blame somewhere between Monday and a dead cat. He added a little humor, simplified the report, and shortened it to one paragraph - - two paragraphs if the accident was a real whing-dinger, or if he considered the report to be a snow-job. Grampa's articles were published in a monthly magazine which was sanctioned by the Navy. The magazine was popular at Maval Air Stations, and on Aircraft Carriers. There was a board certain amount of suspense involved. One could never be sure, particularly if he had been caught in some gross infraction, or been involved in an aircraft accident, that he wouldn't be featured in Grampa Pettybone's next blistering account.

Not everyone agreed with Grampa, but that didn't bother him. He was a little too old and wobbly to fly high performance aircraft off the carriers, but his heart was in the cockpit with every young pilot. The bottom line for Grampa was to preserve human life, and to maintain safety in flying. If the quip from his pen felt like the sting of a lash, it was meant to be just that for the pilots who had displayed certain unhealthy flying habits. Grampa believed that his efforts were all worth while if his comments prevented a single accident or preserved a single life.

Grampa welcomed rebuttals, and the magazine printed those which made a good point. Once he wrote, "The pilot who has enough smarts to get a hunk of iron in the air, and safely land it on the deck of a ship bobbing on the ocean, certainly has the ability to make up his own mind about a paragraph or two written by Grampa Pettybone." In any event, Grampa Pettybone never challenged a single rebuttal.

The grandson, V. P. Pettybone never knew his Grampa. VP was in the old house that afternoon, after his grandfather passed on, when everything in the attic went to the swap-meet. One of the things that was left behind to burn was a stack of magazines wrapped in sail cloth, and tied with an old piece of shot-line. VP confiscated the magazines. He planned to use them to add weight to the bundles of newspapers he regularly sold to the paper recycling outfit across town. One morning while carefully slipping them in between newspapers, one of the magazines fell to the floor, and by pure chance lay open at the page containing one of Grampa Pettybone's more scathing attacks on a young pilot who had accidentally (?) flown a PANTHER under Golden Gate Bridge. That was when VP first learned that his grampa fought WWII with a pen instead of a gun.

VP carefully searched through the old magazines. Sure enough, his grampa had a few lines in almost every one. Grampa was no Hemmingway. But VP enjoyed his grampa's wit and candid narrations. VP thought for a moment that it might be fun to get something in print himself, but then there was no longer a major war, and the PANTHER airplanes had all been melted down, and made into household cooking utinsils. The idea faded, almost as quickly as....

VP traveled a lot. He took along his hand-held, and worked the local repeaters. It gave him somewhat of an insight as to what was going down, and made the evenings in the hotel rooms a little more enjoyable. Sometimes he even checked in on the

local net. In his younger years, before he discovered ham radio, he spent a lot of time in the hotel bars. The drunks, the noise, the waterfront vernacular, and the unnecessary degrading exchanges between customers eventually, drove him away.

VP had spent a number of years on the lower bands with the DXers and the ragchewers. He enjoyed those years. Unfortunately, the drunks, the noise, the waterfront vernacular, the people who distorted the intent of amateur radio by making their own rules ...and the fact that he traveled a lot, finally reduced his operating time on 40 meters to ZERO. But he still had fun on the two-meter repeaters.

While driving through Colby, Kansas one morning he heard a repeater on .34/.94 that claimed only three stations as members. They were glad to have another operator join them, and they invited him over for mid-morning coffee. VP still stops in Colby to see those guys when he goes through. Their group is bigger now. It has 3 operators, and one now-and-then-visitor.

V.P. Pettybone found the repeater environment a little different in Southern California. When he went through San Diego sometime back he noticed that one of the most popular repeaters was .04/.64. At that time the main topic discussed on that repeater was the fact that someone wanted the machine removed from the mountain top. VP wondered why there was such a fuss about getting it OFF the mountain, when that really seemed to be the best place for it. He asked, but never received a straight answer from anyone on .04/.64, so he jotted down a few lines in his note book, and decided he'd ask the boys in Colby, Kansas what they thought. He was pretty sure they'd give their spare coax to have a mountain ...or even a little hill on which to locate a repeater....

Whether by accident or by design, VP's notes eventually took on a little of Grampa Pettybone's motif. VP was not surprised to see patterns emerge in repeater activities around the country. Some similar. Some different, It wasn't long before he decided that the there were only two main differences between open repeaters,

ONE WAS THE DEGREE OF SOPHISTICATION OF THE MACHINES. Some were simple receivetransmit devices, carrier controlled, with the antenna mounted on a water tank or a windmill, like the one in Colby. To turn it off, one merely walked over to the water tank, and pulled the plug from an outlet that had been installed for ...well, no one really knew ...it was just there, and it was hot, so they used it. Other repeaters had computer-controlledlinks, "PL," down-tilt antennas, voice identifiers, etc. They cost a whale of a lot of money to install,and no little amount of attention to keen running. The design and installation of these machines seemed to be of interest to only a hand full of club members ... the dedicated types, who had the ability and the interest to keep them running. Strangely, most of those guys didn't talk much on the machines which they so carefully pampered. Their needs seemed to be satisfied by the fact that they got the machine to the

Their needs seemed to be satisfied by the fact that they got the machine to the top of the mountain, and they kept it operating at some agreed upon level of reliability.

Reapeaters were sometimes thrown to-

Reapeaters were sometimes thrown together with obsolete commercial gear
modified to work on ham frequencies. Such
equipment was noted for intermittent and
unreliable operation. For some operators
THAT was the major challenge. For others
it gave them something to complain about.
Those who complained always talked about
their fellow amateurs as "they" ...they
can't keep this thing running, ...they
think this repeater belongs to THEM,
...they won't listen to me when I tell
them how to keep that repeater 100% operational. However, "THEY" were the only
ones who ever made it to the mountain top
with a tool box and a VOM.

According to VP, THE ONLY OTHER PACTOR WHICH AFFECTED AN OPEN REPEATER WAS THE NUMBER OF PROPLE WHO HAD ACCESS TO THE MACHINE. The geographic location, the sex of the custodian, the weather, big city, little berg...it made very little difference. The variety of activity on the repeater was related only to the number of people who used it. The more operators there were, the greater diversity there was in the type and quality of activity on the repeater.

In the megalopolus along the West Coast VP lost interest in the two-meter drunks, the noise, the repeaters. The sportsmanship, good decay in waterfront vernacular, the people who distorted the intent of ham radio making their own rules ... When God gave man the ability to be obnoxious, VP often thought, He didn't make a mistake. It was just another way that God gave man to show his true character.

NOTEBOOK 1 PETTYBONE'S V.P. enjoyed keeping it. It wasn't much of a masterpiece. It didn't take him long to decide that Grampa Pettybone's ability with the pen wasn't hereditary. VP's notes may never save lives, nor reduce the cost of airplane accidents, but maybe, just maybe, they would give the local operators chance to laugh at themselves, to contemplate, or to cry, or to get mad, Like Grampa Pettybone's pilots, maybe the licensed operators would reevaluated their own operating practices, get an idea just how they appear, good or bad, pleasant or cantankerous, helpful or destructive, a worthy example or a pain in the ass to another operator.

One day the boys in Colby asked VP if they could copy a couple of his anecdotes and pass them on to the editor of the paper for an Amateur Club out there in the middle of Kansas. VP Obliged them, and they sent the notes on the club.

in a few days they had a surprise response from the club's editor: stuff, boys, but we can't use it ... section 605 of the Communications Act of 1934, you know ...



Further, the following priorities must be observed: (1) Emergency traffic, concerning the safety of life or property take priority over all other traffic. Failure to yield to any station indicating the need for such traffic is prohibited, and may render the offender subject to legal action. Indication of the need for such traffic may be "Break Emergency," Break-Break, or any other clearly indicated statement (2) Call-ups should be permitted. If an operator "breaks" into a conversation, he should be permitted to make such a callup. He should not, however, "take over" the repeater and exclude those who were already using it. 'Rag-chewing" is not prohibited, but care must be exercised to assure that the repeater is not fied up for extended periods. Remember, there are almost 900 members, and several hundred non-members, who have as much right to use the facilities as you do. It is extremely discourteous to manopolize them to the exclusion of these other users. Long CSO's should be limited to simplex frequencies or the lower bands.
