The PURPOSE of our REPEATER SYSTEMS is to FACILITATE 2-WAY RADIO COMMUNICATIONS WHERE EXTENDED RANGE IS REQUIRED OR WHERE NATURAL OR MAN-MADE LIMITATIONS TO SIMPLEX COMMUNICATIONS EXIST.

MANDATORY REPEATER OPERATING PROCEDURES

VALID COMMUNICATIONS:

- 1. Emergency communications (IMMEDIATELY acknowledging breaks).
 - a) YOUR CALL REGULAR OR TIME FACTOR TRAFFIC.
 - b) BREAK BREAK (2 breaks) EMERGENCY.
 - c) BREAK BREAK BREAK (3 breaks) LIFE OR DEATH.
- 2. Public Service and demonstrations of Amateur Radio.
- 3. Short transmissions or exchange of information.
- 4. Announcements.

IN-VALID COMMUNICATIONS:

- 1. JAMMING in any form and ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF JAMMING OR INTERFERENCE.
- 2. LONG TRANSMISSIONS (except emergencies)
- RAG-CHEWING QSO's that could be handled adequately on simplex or another band.
- 4. BUSINESS COMMUNICATIONS.
- 5. TESTING ON REPEATERS.
- 6. ABUSIVE language of an offensive or distasteful subject matter.

INTERFERENCE REPORTING PROCEDURE

The first DO's are really DON'T's !! Don't acknowledge.

Don't discuss.

Don't antagonize,

Make the Jammer think his transmitter is not working.

OBSERVATION PROCEDURES

- Listen on input note frequency.
- 2. Note time and date of incident.
- 3. If you have a beam or DF gear, take a bearing (magnetic).
- Note the signal strength and antenna you used (mobile, inside, ground plane, beam, etc.)
- 5. Transmission content; ie: music, carrier, talking, etc.
- Any identifiable characteristics such as hum, background noise, off frequency or discriminator reading.
- 7. Personal observations and opinions as to the source.

FILING THE REPORT

- 1. CALL (714) 286-8550 (unlisted) YOU HAVE 60 seconds.
- 2. Give your full NAME and Call.
- 3. Your location at time of incident, such as street address.
- 4. TIME of incident.
- Bearing magnetic as read on compass.
 Signal strength and antenna you used.
- 7. Transmission content.
- 8. Identifiable characteristics.
- 9. Personal observations and suspicions.

Minutes

Jack, WB6AXW is in charge of contacting the city about Bingo. This is a possible money-making activity for the club.

SANDRA will order the crystals for the low altitude HI-band repeater. Lon donated his former frequency: 146.775-146.175. This will give people meeting on Otay a place to go when they can't make it on simplex.

Feb. 11 will be the Election meeting for SCRA at Cerritos College.

Alex says that reciprocal licensing is moving closer.

Motion made, seconded and passed to propose raising of dues to \$15 annually instead of \$10 due to increases in costs. The motion included a grace period up to April 15 where members could pay in advance for as many years as they wish at the \$10 fee.

A discussion was held as to recommendations for the new Board. These will be passed along as well as the beautiful Leadership Manuals prepared by this Board with the help of Ron, WAGWVX.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:35.

The above tentative frequency sanctions are based upon the information contained in your "Request for Frequency Co-ordination" (RFC) and are subject to a 90 day test period. All concerned co-channel and adjacent channel users are also being notified as indicated below. If there are any problems with those assignments, comments should be MADE IN WRITING WITHIN 14 DAYS. This tentative assignment shall be valid for 90 days, and then considered permanent if no valid evidence is received to the contrary. The following "Conditions", as indicated, are also part of this sanction:

- () HAAT calculations be supplied as per attached form.
- () Receiver documentation as per attached form.
- () FCC application must be received within 30 days for sanction to remain valid.
- XXXXXC "WR" or Remote license to be received within six months for sanction to remain valid.
- () Other The above sanction verifies arrangement made at 220mc Technical Comm. meeting on Jan. 22, 1978 with Paul McClure, WA6HGK who will get another channel.

All frequency sanctions are subject to periodic committee review and may be cancelled due to six months or more inactivity. Since all sanctions are based upon the data in your RFC, any proposed system changes should be directed to the technical committee since other systems may be affected.

Interference

Since the beginning of time, man has lived with interference. Throughout our relatively short existence on this planet, interference has stuck with us as have famine, flood, pestilence and taxes. What has Man done to combat this ancient foe? Man went into the back yard, gazed up at the heavens and was rewarded - with the mechanical filter.

Mechanical filters were nice, but when man blazed new trails into the vast reaches of the spectrum, and reached the Promised Land of 2-meter FM, man discovered that themechanical filter was not enough. So, again man searched the heavens and hoped. Someone waved the magic wand and said, "Let there be helical resonators!"

Man rejoiced - helical resonators were a good answer to the problem of many types of offfrequency interference. But recently man is being threatened with a new type of interference - that which is generated by his fellow man - namely, jamming.

Jammers are a rare breed of men (or something similar) who intentionally interfere with that which is most vulnerable to them - repeaters. Repeaters are the perfect medium by which they can vent their frustrations to a large audience.

We have recently been plagued by jammers from all sides. Jammers who will stop at nothing to have thier fun. In response to the large increase in jammers sprouting up, a group of amateurs with a common goal in mind has been formed. They are hard-working skilled people. These amateurs do not call themselves anything. They have been very successful to this date. They are not interested in grabbing credit, or the "glory of the kill". They are interested in preventing a hobby, which they love dearly, from turning into something like 11 meters, where the law of the jungle rules.

This group has a rather extensive intelligence network, complete with monitoring stations, investigative personnel, exhaustive records kept on as many jammers as can be found, and good relationships with law enforcement agencies at all levels.

Whenever the hunting team pinpoints a jammer, (which is happening all too often lately), there is no vigilante committee. The person responsible for the station on the premises where the interference is coming from is approached in a civilized manner, by two or more members of the hunting team, not at the time of the interference.

The responsible person is questioned to determine if he is personally responsible for the generation of the interference. If this person is responsible for the interference, he is given a choice - to cease and desist at once, or face exposure and possible prosecution.

Sometimes a child will wander into someone's shack and operate the radio. Sometimes it's a young brother or sister. This is a small portion of the cases we have investigated, and the easiest to resolve. Sometimes we are dealing with a radio that was stolen, and is now in the hands of a non-licensed person.... These cases are the smallest portion of our operations.

Unfortunately, there are cases in which the licensed amateur is responsible for the jamming. This is a sad situation where the amateur has some resentment for a person on the repeater or for the repeater itself, and tries to make life miserable for everyone concerned.

The statement I am leading up to, is that most of the interference heard on repeaters is being perpetrated by our fellow amateurs. To me, this person is one of the lowest forms of life on earth. In a few moments of childish hatred, he is destroying a hobby that has prided itself on it's courtesy and consideration to it's members. The jammer's operation strongly opposes every principle that Amateur Radio stands for.

The purpose of this article is to educate. To educate YOU, the Amateur. To inform you that most of the jamming that appears on 2-meter FM is generated by other licensed amateurs. To inform the jammers and potential jammers reading this article that they should think about it before they degrade themselves and all other amateur radio operators. To inform all licensed amateurs, jammers or not, that a highly secretive, profusely skilled, tireless group of amateurs have formed a cohesive team dedicated to the elimination of jamming does, indeed, exist. To inform the Amateur Radio public that they should THINK the next time a jammer appears. They should think that transmitting a carrier on top of the jammer will not help to find him. They should THINK before they advise someone on the repeater not to talk to a jammer - that person may be a member of the hunting tea,.

I thank the Club for printing this article, and I sincerely hope that I have started you to seriously think about what jammers can do to this wonderful hobby if nothing is done about them.

HOW LIKE SANDRA!

This article could have been written by one of the Board of Directors of SANDRA - the same thing is happening here, and the club is taking almost the exact same steps.

This number may be used for reporting any type of interference, for asking for an information packet to be sent to you, for changing your address, or just for communication with the people on the Board.

Knights of the Airways

San Diego - your town and mine - Amateur Radio has no boundaries and the Knights of the Airways prove us right. This column is designed to honor the Amateurs in our community who are doing what comes naturally. The accounts recorded here are for the most part written without the knowledge of the participant. Such an honor is not worked for, asked for, nor is it expected when Amateurs are helping other people in need, whether the victim is an Amateur or not.

Dec. 18: North of Orange on Hwy 805 southbound lanes, a car ran off the road and landed in the ditch. WGYVY was on the scene and called for someone to call the CHP and ambulance. WAGOYI was monitoring 04/64 and picked up the distress call and proceded with info to the CHP.

Palm and Plaza - Mr. Lowe, W6BKA calling for help. "I have a dead battery, and I need someone with battery cables." WA6UDU to the rescue. "WA6UDU, I'm away from my office, but I'll go back and get some cables and I'll be there soon. (He went back six blocks to get the cables.) WA6UDU got Mr. Lowe on the way.

Dec. 26: W6BYY, Gordon, on the scene where a camper has turned over near the center divider. "Send CHP and an ambulance, quick - North of Poinsetta on Hwy I-5." WB6RJB picked up the call a second later. Then W6HJB came on the scene and confirmed the location, "Three miles north of Encinitas, Leucadia area, 4 mile north of La Costa offramp. Info was relayed to CHP.

Dec. 29: 4:45 PM. Hwy 805 northbound, WAGYCA on scene "at intersection of I-5 and 805 - there is a grey Chrysler Cordoba on the soft shoulder - smoke billowing out from the hood. The people are just getting out. Call the Fire Dept!" An unknown amateur answered and made the call.

Jan. 3: 8PM, 805, Red sports car is on the soft shoulder. Ken, WB6VCC called for help. W3YEY/6 picked up the call.

On 805 at Carrol Canyon Rd, two cars overturned in southbound slow lane, gas was pouring out on the Hwy. WB7NNV was on the scene calling Otay. WB6NPT picked up the call and used the autopatch to call the CHP and the Fire Dept. W6ADD was one mile from the scene monitoring. He said he was on the way and would assist. No one injured.

W6VCE on the scene: Fedmart truck westbound I-8 at Mountain Springs Grade jack-knifed and hit a Pinto. One man was trapped inside Pinto. Two men stopped and tried to get him out. They checked his pulse - nothing. They were trying to get him out when it caught fire. Flames were shooting 100 feet in the air. W6VCE could not bring up Laguna. Finally received a response on 04/64. Other hams near or on the scene using simples got the CHP and Fire Dept. in action. The Fedmart driver was not injured. The Border Patrol was not far behind. Their radio didn't work. All communications was handled by amateurs. W6LAW handled the traffic - called all emergency vehicles. W6VCE stayed on scene until everything was in good shape.

Jan. 26: 4:30 PM. WDGDJK called CHP for an accident on 805 - a car sideways in center lane. No one hurt.

Emergency Assistance Report

I have received a large number of cards upon taking over the EAR editorship, but only six were from December. A new supply of cards should be ready next month. Some of of the old ones will be available at the meeting at Cavellini's.

Last Sept 11th Mike, CFMC's HAM HELP chairman called the Evanston PD to contact Chicago for paramedics to assist at an accident with injuries at 84th and the Dan Ryan, Earl W9CK made the original call.

Larry, WE9LOZ used the 220 autopatch to call the Police for assistance to a stalled auto on 294 near Dundee Road on 9/15/77.

A three car accident on the Calumet Expressway at 123rd was sided by WB9RZO calling WB9PCB who called the Chicago PD last October 3rd.

The 220 autopatch keeps getting more and more use in emergency situations Joe, WB9THV called the Sheriff's Police on 10/2 for an accident on the Kennedy near Edens; Squeak, K7RBM, our new president called the Minutemen for a motorist with a blown tire in a traffic lane of I-90 on 11/1/77; and Joe again on 12/11 used the autopatch to call the Mt. Prospect PD about an accident on Rt. 83 at Dempster.

K9MDM, Lefty called WB9YXD who called the State Police and Skokie Police for 2 accidents just 2 miles apart on the Edens last Oct, 7th.

Herb, WB9YGK relayed to the Niles PD of a 3 car accident at Dempster and Harlem reported by WB9WGI on October 31.

Thanks to Pete, K9VCZ and Doug, WB9TWW a Niles Snowplow was sent clean-up the snowy mess at Milwaukee and Dempster on Now 11th after Doug called the Niles PD.

Doug was kept busy later that month on the morning of the 16th when he reported 2 stalled cars, one stalled bus with on of the cars blocking traffic on the I-90 xway near I-294. K9BCH and W9GDH assisted. The Cook County Sheriff was notified.

On 11/22 WB9UHA ran out of gas on 1-55 near Pulaski. WB9OXW answered his call for help by bringing him a gallon of gas.

A stalled car on the Calumet Xway blocking traffic was reported to the State Police by Lee, W9MOL after Chuck, WB9EJV called on CPMC.

Lee, W9MOL called the Sheriff at 10am on Dec 23rd to relay a message from WB9YKB about a stalled car at Harlem and North Av. Just an hour and a half later he called the Sheriff again to report an accident with injuries on the Eisenhower East of Sacramento as reported by W9HMW.

Also on Dec. 23rd K7RBM, Squeak notified the Police of a 3 vehicle accident on the Edens at Old Orchard, as reported by WB9MOV.

SANDRA, Inc. operates the following repeaters for service to the San Diego area and environs. The policy of the organization is that the repeaters are available for all licensed Amateurs to use, so long as applicable rules and regulations are observed. whether members of SANDRA, Inc. or not. Further, the following priorities must be observed: (1) Emergency traffic, concerning the safety of life or property take priority over all other traffic. Failure to yield to any station indicating the need for such traffic is prohibited, and may render the offender subject to legal action. Indication of the need for such traffic may be "Break Emergency," "Break-Break," or any other clearly indicated statement. (2) Call-ups should be permitted. If an operator "breaks" into a conversation, he should be permitted to make such a callup. He should not, however, "take over" the repeater and exclude those who were already using it. (3) "Rag-chewing" is not prohibited, but care must be exercised to assure that the repeater is not tied up for extended periods. Remember, there are almost 400 members, and several hundred non-members, who have as much right to use the facilities as you do. It is extremely discourteous to monopolize them to the exclusion of these other users. Long QSO's should be limited to simplex frequencies or the lower bands.
