The present Board of Directors came into office in the wake of mass resignations in June 1980, and were unopposed at 1981 election time. (N6AVR, Bob Avila our meeting chairman, came on board in the spring of 1981 to replace WB6RIR).

THE ELECTIONS

SANDRA annually elects a Board of Directors comprised of 6 officers and 3 members (directors) at large. SQUELCH TALES describes the process through quotes from our by-laws:

- An annual meeting of the members shall be held in February of each year for the purpose of electing directors....
- The number of directors shall be nine (9). The Board of Directors shall be comprised of the President, Vice president, Treasurer, Secretary, Membership Committee Chairman, and Meeting Committee Chairman, along with three (3) at large directors, all of whom are to be elected at the annual meeting of members. (if proposed by-laws changes are approved at our January meeting, the immediate past President also will be a member of the board).

Any two or more offices may be held by one person except the offices of President and Secretary.

Each director shall hold office for a period of one (1) year. (Proposed change will provide for one year term for one at large director, two years for the second, and three years for the third).

Nominations for the officers and directors of the corporation shall be made by the nominations committee which shall present a slate of nominees at least thirty (30) days prior to the annual meeting. (KF6Z, Tom and KA6LAG, Earl, were named conominations of the chairman committee at the December 3, 1981 Their Board of Directors meeting. slate was presented to the board on January 7, 1981 and will be presented to the membership at the January 21 membership meeting.)

In addition, nominations may be made by the members entitled to vote at the annual meeting. (Proposed by-laws change provides that all nominations will be closed at the conclusion of the January membership meeting. Nominations will be accepted from the floor at the January meeting.)

- A candidate for office of Director shall:
 - (1) Have been a regular member in good standing for at least one (1) year in the last three (3) years.
 - (2) Indicate his or hers willing ness to accept the nomination in writing or in person at the meet ing.

Thats's the way the nomination process works, folks. Assuming by-law changes are approved, the last chance you have to get your hat in the ring is the January 21 membership meeting.

The Election Process?

The by-laws are not specific on this subject, other than that the annual meeting in Febuary shall be for this purpose; that "If the election of directors is not held as designated herein for an annual meeting, or any adjournment thereof, the Board of Directors shall cause the election to be held at a special meeting of the members as soon thereafter as such may be conveniently held"; and that "votes for officers and directors must be cast in person and may not be cast by proxy".

The following process (by-laws changes assumed approved in January) was adopted at the January 7, 1982 Board meeting:

- If there remains no more than one candidate for each office at the conclusion of the January membership meeting, the nominated candidates shall be considered elected, and shall take office at the conclusion of the Febuary membership meeting.
- of there is more than one candidate for any office at the conclusion of the January membership meeting, a ballot will be prepared. The ballot will be mailed to members eligible to vote. Mailing will be February 4, 1982.
- pm at the Febuary 18 membership meeting, or mailed to the club post office box. No ballots will be collected from the box after noon, Febuary 18, 1982.

POTPOURRI BY W6UZL

OPEN FOR BUSINESS- One of the regular advertisers in SQUELCH TALES is Integrated Circuits Unlimited Inc., you can get super buys and a large integrated circuits selection of electronic parts. management has asked us to announce that contrary to rumor this firm is, and will remain, open for business. The associated firm, Electronics Emporium, was disolved back in 1980, and the ham radio and C.B. lines are no longer carried. See ICU ad on page 2 of this edition.

FROM HR REPORT - Japanese repeaters are expected to be authorized in the near future, and the JARL has announced new VHF/UHF bandplans set up to accommodate them. Key points of the new bandplans are enlarging of the FM segments of the 144 and 440 Mhz bands to provide room for repeaters, and moving the present 52.5-Mhz beacon frequency to 50.010 Mhz. That latter move puts Japan into agreement with the rest of the world, with beacons at the lower band edge to better signal band openings.

CB BECAME LEGAL IN GREAT BRITAIN - Monday, November 2, on the 27-Mhz band as in the rest of the CB world but using FM instead of AM. The switch to FM was made to avoid "legalizing" the million CB rigs already estimated to be operating in England, but early reports are that the English CB community is less than entused about the changes in mode.

IN THE NEWS AGAIN - In the September 1981 SQUELCH TALES we gave a pat on the back to SANDRA member Jerry Boyd, WA6CUP, new Chief of Police for Coronado for his role in the rescue of kidnapped Maria Martin. Jerry is in the news again, as the author of a fine article on page 64 of January QST. The article was written when he was still a captain in the police department of Irvine. Look it up!

PLAIN LANGUAGE REWRITE DEAD - SANDRA, along with most ham organizations, encouraged comments on the plain language rewrite of Part 97 of the FCC rules. The FCC tells us that "The Commission has decided to forego its proposed major rewrite and codification of the Amateur Radio Service rules due (Continued on Page 11)


The reports from the trustees are due for insurance coverages.

If your traffic is complex and you are getting nowhere, QSY or sign clear until the jamming goes away. Jammers, by their very nature, are trying to join the "group". By talking to them or about them you are furnishing them their attention. To get angry is even worse. Ignore them. Don't even mention them casually during the QSO. Don't let it get to you. The repeater will not be shut down for jamming. This decision is based on two conditions:

If you are not content ignoring the jammer and want to help, don't talk about it on the repeater. Buy input crystals (if not synthesized), calibrate your beam or buy an "L-Per" or "Dop-Scan" and learn how to use it. Report the relative intensity of the jamming signal by telephoning to the SANDRA Interference number, (714) 286-8550 or to any Board Member. Dear Sir:

It seems the the repeater operational procedure as delineated by the ARRL, and in common use has been made obsolete by the widening use of scanning trans ceivers and scanners. I have had, and I am sure others have had the experience of hearing, "This is W6XYZ monitoring", and before we can identify the frequency, or stop the scanning, the scanner is off and running. This type of call is only 3-4 seconds, not long enough to read the frequency or stop the scan. A scanner covering 10 or more memories in around 10 seconds could have missed the call entirely.

The following procedure is suggested when making a CQ call. "This is W6XYZ, I spell whiskey six x-ray yankee zulu, monitoring 146.52" (or 146.64 etc). This call takes about 9-10 seconds and accomplishes several things, (1) makes, it more probable that the scanner will pick up the call. (2) Gives you more time to stop the scanner. (3) The frequency, given last, is almost sure to be heard, even if the scanner picks up only the end of the transmission. This would allow us to monitor the frequency to see if the call is repeated.

I operate mobile quite often away from metroplolitan areas where there are not many stations using their repeater. Under these conditions I believe this would be of particular procedure benifit. My usual procedure is, from the ARRL repeater directory, to locate the most probable stations that I might It's work and set them in the scanner. exasperating, after 2 hours of nothing on the rig, 2 hours of watching the sagebrush go by, to hear, "...ontering", or "W5XYZ monitoring", and not being able to come back because your eyeballs couldn't leave the road and pick up the numbers on your rig quick enough, or didn't get to the stop button soon The station calling wants a QSO, you would certainly welcome a QSO to break the monotony...but no contact.

This longer, more explict call would be of a great benifit in a "break..break", or "break..break..break" situation where it is imperative that your call or the

other stations be heard and the frequency identified... Make your call at least 10 seconds long and end it with the frequency used.

Note: The above is based on my experience with a Kerwood 7800, a Kerwood 2400 and a Bearcat 210.

SIMULATED EMERGENCY TEST - 1981 by Art Smith, W6INI ARRL Section Communications Manager

Simulated Emergency Test (SET) is the name given to the annual emergency drill sponsored by the American Radio Relay League. It involves the Amateur Radio Emergency Service, National Traffic System, Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service, and clubs and nets without specific affiliation.

The objective of the SET held in San Diego County on the morning of December 5, 1981 were:

- 1. To test ARES communications plans.
- To determine communications conditions from contigency locations.
- To provide operator experience in locating and setting up communications at the contingency locations.
- 4. Where agency personnel were participating, to familiarize operators with the type and content of message traffic, and to familiarize agency personnel with the use of Amateur Radio.
- To familiarize operators with formal message format message and handling procedures.

The simulated disaster was widespread flooding which resulted in the need for evacuating residents in several area of The SET plan provided for the county. the San Diego County of support Department of Health Services, American Red Cross, San Diego (city) Office of Emergency Management, and the Rancho Civil Emergency Bernardo Approximately 90 operators participated and nine repeaters were used.

had 13 Health Departmen+ Net The located in San Diego, stations Oceanside, Vista, San Marcos, Escondido, El Cajon, and Chula Vista. The Palomar Club's 13/73 repeater did an outstanding job for this widespread net. The Health Dept had personnel at all locations to generate realistic-sounding traffic.

The Red Cross communications systems, Cross personnel at locations, provided communications from the Chapter headquarters in San Diego to service Centers in Oceanside, Escondido, El Cajon and Chula Vista via the 220 club's 224.90 repeater. Secondary nets to each service center evacuation centers for which each was responsible used repeaters in Vista, Escondido and the Poway ARS repeater on frequencies. simplex 63/03. and Simulated evacuation centers totaled 18 and were manned by Red Cross volunteers. The simplex net for the Chula Vista Service Center was backed up by a net on 75 meters.

The San Diego Emergency Net provided communications on SANDRA's Lyons Peak repeater with stations located at the San Diego Emergency Operations Center (EOC), six police sub-stations, and the Bernardo Command Post. Rancho Rancho Bernardo net was staffed by the community's Civil Emergency Committee using the Poway ARS repeater. For flood information gathering a net operated on Mission Hills repeater (WD6APP) keeping the flood Information Center in touch with mobile units taking water readings along the San level River.

A local Red Cross net used the K60PY repeater located on Mt. Soledad and exercise coordination was accomplished with stations with stations on the WB6WBH 220 repeater.

All exercise objectives were met but it was noted that most participants were in need of more exposure to the fine art of handling written messages using standard format and procedures. Regular participating in the polomar ARC's North County Traffic Net (13/73), which operates daily at 2000, is an excellent way to accomplish this.

DALLAS AMATEURS FORM GROUP TO REDUCE AMATEUR JAMMING

An automatic radio direction finding system is currently being developed to help clean up the 2-meter band. Called the Metroplex RDF Project by its

founders, Ken Winters, N5AUX, and J.R. Ewing, WASWSN, the system will initially use four remote controlled RDF units located at strategic points surrounding the Dallas-Ft. Worth (Texas) metroplex. These two cities are about 30 miles apart and tests have shown that a one watt signal can easily be tracked at more than twice that distance across both cities under line-of-light conditions.

The proposed system will use Doppler type DF devices and synthesized 2-meter transceivers controlled by 220 or 450 mhz transcievers (possibly all HT's) via "black box" interface devices. The entire remote RDF unit including the antenna and power supply might be total ly self-contained and housed within a one cubic foot cabinet. When the system isn't being used to track signals, the remote units can be switched over to remote base stations.

In actual operation, the remote units would be tuned to a specific frequency and each would take a bearing on every The remote units would signal heard. then transmit the bearings to a central control/decoding system consisting of a control link transciever and a pocket The computer microcomputer. triangulates the bearing information and grid-map coordinates which returns the location of the signal indicate source to the central transceiver transmission to the mobil D.F. operators in the vicinity of the source.

In fact, the dual goal of the project is to establish not only a working system for automatic direction finding, but to establish a permanant, serious minded organization of individuals, repeater groups, and radio clubs across the country that will be capable of maintaining, using and expanding the initial system as far as the imagination can take it.

METROPLEX

One of the features of the Sunday night and Wednesday night SANDRA nets is the WESTLINK AMATEUR RADIO NEWS. Over the past few weeks, WESTLINK has featured a story about a successful repeater operation in a very tough enviroment. SQUELCH TALES excerpts:

"With all the bad news we seem to be running into regards to repeater operation these days, it is kind of refreshing to run across what can only be termed as a true sucess story.

"Can you believe that there is a big city repeater with over 700 members, user access cross links to other bands, and an autopatch? Well there is, and it is located in the heart of the Big Apple - New York City.

"The system is called 'Metroplex', and in a three part story we learn how all this came about. Your host, one of the owners of this phenonemon, Burt Grebin, K2KLN:

"In late 1976 or early 1977, I got together with Alex, WB 2MGB, and Andy, whose call at that time was WB2VUJ, and what we tried to do was to think about the kinds of things in VHF and UHF that were going on around the Tri-State area that were not really in the best interests or spirit of amateur radio, and come up with a way of providing a nice form on the air for amateurs who would feel welcome to an open system. Unfortunatly at that time frequencies were not available for allocation through TSARC, the Tri-State Amateur Repeater Concil, for this area. So, we went about the task of getting the equipment, buying it, and getting it all together, getting some sites, and just waiting for our turn. The sub-bands opened, and we were able to put our 145.450 machine on the air."

"Actually, Metroplex is more than a single system; rather, it is a group of repeaters owned by one club that operate on various VHF and UHF bands. How does a system this big survive? Burt Grebin tells us:

"500 members are active on any one of the repeaters. The numbers got big, I think, because people liked the way the operation went. It was casual. It was open. We tried to stay away from the things that get people into difficulties. Like talking about Federal organizations, and talking about subjectives that might be argumentative.

(Burt went on to talk about how a system this big handles the problem of malicious interference.)

"To tell you that we don't have jamming would be an outright lie. I think every repeater, no matter where it experiences jamming. There are peaks and valleys to the jamming problem. approach has been to basically ignore Stations do not try to overpower the jammer, they don't talk - at least on Metroplex this is the philosophy that we have praticed over the last four or fives years, and it seems to be success We don't encourage them, and we don't talk about direction finding on the air. There is a committee that operates very quietly and does their The legal boundaries are made clear to all members of the group so that nobody's toes are stepped on. think by just ignoring the jammers we have probably dealt with them the best way we know how."

SANDRA OPERATES TWO NETS:

Sunday Evening at 8:00 p.m. on 04/64 Wednesday Eve. at 7:30 p.m. on 75/15

SANDRA, Inc. operates the following repeaters for service to the San Diego area and environs. The policy of the organization is that the repeaters are available for all licensed Amateurs to use, so long as applicable rules and regulations are observed. whether members of SANDRA, Inc. or not. Further, the following priorities must be observed: (1) Emergency traffic, concerning the safety of life or property take priority over all other traffic. Failure to yield to any station indicating the need for such traffic is prohibited, and may render the offender subject to legal action. Indication of the need for such traffic may be "Break Emergency," "Break-Break," or any other clearly indicated statement. (2) Call-ups should be permitted. If an operator "breaks" into a conversation, he should be permitted to make such a callup. He should not, however, "take over" the repeater and exclude those who were already using it. "Rag-chewing" is not prohibited, but care must be exercised to assure that the repeater is not tied up for extended periods. Remember, there are almost 900 members, and several hundred non-members, who have as much right to use the facilities as you do. It is extremely discourteous to monopolize them to the exclusion of these other users. Long QSO's should be limited to simplex frequencies or the lower bands.
